Many years ago, it was determined that I should be the Longmont Dairy historian, so that we don't forget where we have come from. Twenty five plus years have passed since we first celebrated Earth Day and we are still pleased to be packaging milk in glass bottles and using some of the same processes we used in the beginning days. Plastic was all the rage, but our equipment was still good, and so we kept using glass. As the years went by we realized that plastic was just thrown in the dump, while we used our glass over and over. The bottle design has not changed very much over the years except to accommodate the plastic caps instead of foil, and the glass material certainly hasn't changed.


Over the years, we've employed some very good people in the creamery who've maintained the equipment and keep the process running smoothly. Thankfully technology hasn't changed much in bottle filling. We still separate the milk from the cream, pasteurize the milk and homogenize it in the same way as in the 80s.

Even our present cows are descendants from the first herd David and I purchased in 1988. They are producing more milk than they did back then due to better herd health, but the care and management of the herd remains much the same as back in the day.

So all of that to say, thank you dear friends for your loyalty over the years in keeping us in a sustainable business that will celebrate Earth Day yet another year.

## Easter Breakfast Casserole

1 pound bacon

¼ cup diced onion

¼ cup diced green bell pepper

3 cups shredded Cheddar cheese

8 eggs

2 cups Longmont Dairy milk

1 (16 ounce) package frozen hash brown potatoes, thawed

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F. Lightly grease a 7x11 inch casserole dish.

Fry the bacon in a large, deep skillet over medium-high heat until evenly browned, about 10 minutes. Drain on a paper towel-lined plate. Crumble.

In a large bowl beat together eggs and milk. Mix in cheese, bacon, onion and green pepper. Stir in the thawed hash browns. Pour mixture into prepared casserole.

Cover with aluminum foil and bake in preheated oven for 45 minutes. Uncover and bake for another 30 minutes until eggs have set. Makes 12 servings.
